Granny Flats: Getting It Right from the Start

Granny flats — or secondary dwellings, as councils prefer to call them — have exploded across Australian suburbs. Whether you're housing ageing parents, creating rental income, or building an independent living space for adult children, the garage component often gets treated as an afterthought. That's a mistake.

Council Requirements Matter

Most Australian councils require that secondary dwellings comply with the same building codes as the main house. That means your garage door isn't exempt from standards around wind loading, bushfire ratings (in BAL-rated areas), and structural fixing requirements. B&D's doors are tested and certified to Australian Standards, which matters when your certifier comes knocking.

If your granny flat includes a carport or single garage — and most do, as councils typically require at least one off-street parking space per dwelling — the door needs to be properly engineered for the opening size and local wind region. This isn't something you want to cheap out on with an uncertified import.

Matching the Main Dwelling

Street presentation is a condition of most development approvals. Councils expect secondary dwellings to be sympathetic to the main house in materials and colour. B&D's Colorbond colour range makes this straightforward — you can match your granny flat's garage door to the main house exactly, choosing from the same palette of Colorbond steel colours used on the primary dwelling's door, roof, or fencing.

The Rollmasta is the natural fit here. It's a compact roller door available in Colorbond colours, and when paired with a Power Drive opener, it gives your granny flat the same convenience as the main house without the premium price tag.

Single-Car Openings Are Typical

Most granny flat garages are single-car width — typically 2,400mm to 3,000mm wide. Both the Rollmasta and Panelift handle these sizes comfortably. The Rollmasta's compact roll-up design is particularly well suited to smaller structures where headroom or side room is limited, since it coils above the opening rather than tracking back along the ceiling.

Automation for Accessibility

If your granny flat is housing elderly parents or anyone with mobility challenges, an automated opener isn't a luxury — it's a necessity. Being able to open the garage from inside the car, or via a wall button, removes the physical effort of lifting a manual door. B&D's Power Drive opener is compact, reliable, and includes safety features like auto-reverse and obstruction detection that matter when the door user might be less agile.

The B&D Secure+ smartphone connectivity option also lets family members monitor whether the door has been left open — useful peace of mind when you're keeping an eye on a parent living independently next door.

Studios and Creative Spaces: Where Insulation Earns Its Keep

The backyard studio trend shows no signs of slowing. Home offices, art studios, music rooms, podcast spaces, photography studios — Australians are building dedicated creative spaces in their backyards at record rates. And for these applications, the garage door you choose has a direct impact on how usable the space actually is.

Insulation Matters More Than You Think

A standard steel garage door is essentially a single skin of metal. In summer, it radiates heat inward. In winter, it bleeds warmth out. For a shed you visit twice a week, that's tolerable. For a studio where you're spending eight hours a day, it's miserable — and expensive if you're running a heater or air conditioner against an uninsulated door.

B&D's Insul-Shield option transforms the Panelift into a genuine building envelope. The insulated panels reduce thermal transfer significantly, helping maintain a stable interior temperature without your

HVAC system working overtime. For a music studio or podcast room, the added density of insulated panels also provides meaningful noise attenuation — reducing both the sound escaping out and the neighbourhood noise bleeding in.

Lighting and the Wide Opening Advantage

Many studio applications benefit from a garage door that can open fully to flood the space with natural light or to move large equipment in and out. The Panelift sectional door opens completely, tracking up and back along the ceiling to leave the full opening clear. This is ideal for:

- **Art studios** where you need natural light and ventilation, or need to move large canvases and materials
- **Photography studios** where you occasionally want that wide-open indoor/outdoor feel for shoots
- **Workshops** where timber, sheet goods, or equipment need to pass through regularly
- **Music rooms** where you want to open up for fresh air between sessions without removing the door

Security for Valuable Equipment

Studios tend to house expensive gear — computers, instruments, cameras, power tools. The Panelift Secure provides enhanced locking and tamper resistance compared to a basic roller door. Combined with a B&D; opener featuring auto-lock functionality, your studio contents stay protected whether you're home or not.

Garden Sheds and Storage: Keep It Simple, Keep It Secure

Not every outbuilding needs a premium door. Garden sheds, storage buildings, farm equipment shelters, and detached garages used purely for storage have different requirements: the door needs to work reliably, keep weather and intruders out, and ideally not cost a fortune.

Flex-A-Door: When No Power Means No Problem

The Flex-A-Door is B&D;'s tilt-action door designed for manual operation. It's spring-balanced for easy lifting — no electricity required, no opener to install, no wiring to run. For a shed at the back of a large property, a rural outbuilding without power, or a garden storage building where you open the door a few times a week, this is exactly the right tool for the job.

At \$700–\$1,000 installed, the Flex-A-Door is the most budget-friendly B&D; option while still delivering proper engineering, tested springs, and a Colorbond steel finish that won't look out of place.

Rollmasta: Budget Automation

If you do have power to your shed and want the convenience of a remote-controlled door — particularly useful if you're driving a ride-on mower or vehicle in regularly — the Rollmasta paired with a Power Drive opener hits the sweet spot. You get automated operation at a price point that makes sense for a secondary structure, without compromising on reliability.

Security for Tools and Equipment

Garden sheds are a target for theft. An unsecured or poorly fitted door is an invitation. Both the Flex-A-Door (with its manual locking) and the Rollmasta (with opener-integrated locking) provide genuine security. The key is proper installation by an Accredited Dealer who ensures the door fits the opening correctly with no gaps or weak points.

Matching the Main House: Street Appeal Without the Stress

One of the most common concerns when adding an outbuilding is whether the new garage door will look odd next to the existing house. The good news: B&D; makes this easy.

Colorbond Colour Matching

B&D's residential range is available in the full Colorbond colour palette. If your main house has a Surfmist Panelift, your granny flat can have a Surfmist Rollmasta. If the house is Monument, the shed can be Monument. The colours are identical because they're all drawn from the same BlueScope Colorbond steel range.

This matters more than people realise. Council development applications for secondary dwellings almost always include a condition about visual compatibility. Having a matching door ticks that box without requiring a custom solution.

Consistent Street Appearance

Even if your outbuilding isn't visible from the street, maintaining visual consistency across your property adds value. When you eventually sell, a buyer walking through will notice if the shed door is a different shade of grey or a visibly cheaper product. Consistent B&D doors across the property signal that the owner took care of the details.

Different Door Styles Can Still Work Together

You don't need the same door type everywhere. A Panelift on the main house and a Rollmasta on the granny flat can look perfectly cohesive if they're in the same colour. The profile difference between a sectional panel door and a roller door is actually quite subtle from the street, especially when the colours match.

Do You Even Need an Opener?

This is a genuine question worth asking. Automatic openers add cost, require power, and introduce another component that needs maintenance. For some applications, they're essential. For others, they're overkill.

Can I install a garage door on a shed that wasn't built for one?

In most cases, yes — but it depends on the structural integrity of the opening. B&D; Accredited Dealers can assess whether your shed frame can support a door and recommend any reinforcement needed. The Flex-A-Door and Rollmasta both have relatively modest structural requirements compared to heavier sectional doors.

What's the smallest opening B&D; can fit?

B&D; doors can be manufactured to suit openings as narrow as 1,800mm wide, which covers most single-car and utility shed applications. Your dealer will measure the opening and recommend the best product for the specific dimensions.

Do I need council approval to add a garage door to an existing shed?

Generally, replacing or adding a door to an existing approved structure doesn't require separate approval. However, if you're enclosing an open carport or changing the use of a building, check with your local council first. Your B&D; dealer can advise on common local requirements.

How long does installation take for a small door?

A single Rollmasta or Flex-A-Door installation on an existing opening typically takes 2–4 hours. If structural modifications are needed, allow a full day. Your dealer will confirm the timeframe at the quoting stage.

Can I match my new shed door to my existing house door exactly?

Yes — if your existing door is a B&D; product in a Colorbond colour, your dealer can match it precisely. Even if you're choosing a different door type (say, Rollmasta for the shed vs Panelift for the house), the same Colorbond colour ensures visual consistency.

Is the Flex-A-Door secure enough for storing valuable items?

The Flex-A-Door includes manual locking as standard, which provides solid security for a shed or storage building. For higher-value contents like workshop equipment or vehicles, consider stepping up to a Rollmasta with an opener, which adds auto-locking functionality and removes the key-access vulnerability.
