The Heritage Challenge: Old Charm, Modern Demands Australia is home to some of the most beautiful period architecture in the world. From the ornate lacework of Victorian terraces to the deep verandahs of Queenslander homes, from the geometric symmetry of Art Deco to the earthy warmth of Californian Bungalows — these homes tell the story of their era. But they also present a unique challenge when it comes to one of the most visible elements of any home: the garage door.

A garage door can account for up to 60 per cent of a home's street-facing facade. Get it wrong, and even the most lovingly restored heritage home can look jarring and out of place. Get it right, and the garage door becomes a seamless extension of the home's architectural story.
