What a tilt garage door is

A tilt garage door (also called a tilting or tip-up door) is a **solid single panel** that opens in one fluid motion — it doesn't break into sections or roll up. The rigid panel swings on side arms, outward and upward, to be stored along the garage ceiling.

Because the panel swings outward as it opens, a tilt door **requires ample space in front of the garage**. That single constraint drives most of the decision-making around them.

Tilt doors are often found on smaller garages and car spaces, built as a single panel reinforced with a frame. Their characteristics:

- Open outwards and swing upwards
- Do not require excess headroom inside the garage
- Can be clad in different colours and materials to suit design needs
- Can be manufactured to fit unique spaces

That last point is why tilt doors persist: for an unusual or heritage opening, a custom-built tilt panel can fit where a mass-produced door cannot.

What B&D; actually supplies: tilt door fittings

B&D; does not manufacture complete tilt doors. What B&D; supplies is the **hardware** — the B&D; range of Tilt Garage Door fittings.

In B&D;'s own framing, these fittings "offer the opportunity to create a door that is in harmony with its surroundings, giving the building a truly tailored and unique appearance," with durability and safety as the primary concerns. The fittings let a builder or installer construct a custom tilt door clad to match the building, "only limited by your imagination."

The fittings are **particularly suited to larger tilt doors**, where greater stability comes from adding horizontal tracks that hold the door in the open position — minimising how far the panel protrudes outside the opening.

In practice this means: if you have an existing tilt door needing repair, or you're building a custom tilt door for a distinctive opening, B&D; fittings are the relevant product. If you're shopping for a finished, off-the-shelf tilt door, B&D;'s answer is the Flex-A-Door below.

B&D;'s recommended alternative: the Flex-A-Door

For anyone replacing an existing tilt door, B&D; points to the **Flex-A-Door** — which it describes as Australia's premium steel sliding garage door and "the perfect alternative when you are looking to replace your existing tilt door, or in situations where you have restricted headroom in your garage or carport."

How it works: the Flex-A-Door uses the famous B&D; Roll-A-Door curtain fitted on a **curving track**, lifting the door from vertical up into horizontal, close to the ceiling, for a clean, neat appearance.

Why B&D; frames it as the safer choice: in B&D;'s words, it delivers "all of the features of a traditional tilt door without the nasty safety hazards." Specifically:

- **No forward protrusion** — Flex-A-Door fits *behind* the opening and does not swing outward like jamb or canopy tilting doors. No swing arc to keep clear, no risk to anyone or anything parked close to the door
- **Fits unusual openings** — because it sits behind the opening, it can be fitted to openings with unusual shapes, including arches
- **Beats roller doors on headroom** — where limited headroom above the opening rules out a sectional or roller door, Flex-A-Door squeezes into tighter spaces

If you have an existing tilt door: safety first

Many Australian homes still have working tilt doors, and the maintenance principles are consistent regardless of who built them.

The spring warning — read this one

Never attempt to adjust or replace counterbalance springs yourself. Tilt door springs are under extreme tension and can cause serious injury if they snap or are released incorrectly. Spring work is for a qualified technician, always.

Warning signs that a spring needs professional attention:

| What you notice | What it usually means | ---|---| | The door has become heavy to lift | Worn or broken spring | | The door won't stay open | Spring tension has dropped | | **The door slams shut** | Broken

spring or disconnected arm — **stop using the door and call a technician** | | The opener is straining | Door out of balance; balance it before blaming the motor |

A balanced door should hold roughly still when left halfway open — neither dropping nor rising. If it doesn't, book a technician rather than adjusting anything.

Routine care you can safely do

- **Visual checks** — look over springs, pivot arms and brackets for wear, rust or looseness; check weatherseals for cracks and gaps - **Lubrication** — a light machine oil on pivot points, hinges and moving parts - **Fasteners** — check and tighten nuts, bolts and screws - **Cleaning** — wash with clean water and a soft brush. For Colorbond steel, B&D; advises washing every 14 days in coastal areas. Avoid abrasive cleaners, harsh chemicals and direct high-pressure washing - **Touch-ups** — sand and touch up surface scratches with matching paint to prevent corrosion taking hold

Choosing between tilt, roller and sectional
